Fun For Families

Make Egg Carton Seed Starters

Materials

- **Cardboard Egg Carton**
- **Potting Soil**
- **Seeds** (recommend cucumbers or radishes as they are easy to grow)
- **Spray Bottle**
- **Scissors**
- **Garden Trowel**

Prepare the planter

Cut egg carton in half. Add potting soil to individual egg cups in carton.

Add seeds

Poke a hole in the center of each cup. Place one seed in the hole. Cover with soil

Moisten the soil

Spray soil with water. Place on tray and take indoors.

Water and wait

Keep the egg carton in a warm light filled location until they begin to sprout. Make sure to water seeds everyday. The soil should stay very moist. Once they look like the middle carton of seedlings in the picture below, they are ready to transfer.

Transfer to a permeant location

Make sure the egg carton is very wet and saturated before moving the seedling outdoors. Tear off one of the egg carton cups.

Place in the soil

Dig a hole in the container you are transferring to, using your trowel. Place the egg carton cup directly in the soil. It will decompose. Water your seedling.



F.Y.S.G. For Your Spiritual Growth

I am writing this newsletter on Ash Wednesday, so I thought this FAQ particularly relevant.

QUESTION: Would you please explain the significance of Ash Wednesday? I've seen some people in the past with black ash crosses on their foreheads.

ANSWER: *Lutheran Worship: History and Practice*, a commentary on *Lutheran Worship*, one of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod's hymnals, says this about ashes on Ash Wednesday: "Other customs may be used, particularly the imposition of ashes on

those who wish it. This ancient act is a gesture of repentance and a powerful reminder about the meaning of the day.

Ashes can symbolize dust-to-dustness and remind worshipers of the need for cleansing, scrubbing and purifying. If they are applied during an act of kneeling, the very posture of defeat and submission expresses humility before God."

The use of ashes on Ash Wednesday is a more recent custom among most LCMS congregations, although some have done it for decades. The ashes are usually derived from the burned palms from the previous Palm Sunday.

Experience will show, however, that in obtaining ashes this way, it doesn't take many ashes to "ash" a whole congregation. Like sin, they are very dirty and go a long way. One palm leaf will produce enough ashes for several years.

Usually the pastor takes the ashes on the end of his thumb and makes the sign of the cross on the forehead of each worshiper, saying these words: "Remember: you are dust, and to dust you shall return." This follows most effectively prior (or as part of) the Service Corporate Confession and Absolution on pages 290-291 of the *Lutheran Service Book*.
